The local authority responsible for the park will typically capture this along with its official name, assigning it a UPRN and positioning its "point" at its visual or geographic centre.
Do UPRNs ever get reused / recycled at a different property?	No, never. UPRNs are unique and persistent, they stay with the property it has been assigned to.
Do you have individual UPRN's for static caravans in caravan sites?	Yes, although it depends if the local authority has capture the caravan in that way. Static caravan sites should be treated as dwellings and therefore assigned a UPRN if they are liable for council tax.
